

The Beginning of Wisdom

1 Kings 4:32-34, Psalms 1:1-6, Deuteronomy 10:12-13, Proverbs 1:1-33, Proverbs 4:5-6, Proverbs 3:1-8

Proverbs

- People came from all the nations to hear the wisdom of Solomon.
- The purpose of Proverbs is "for learning about wisdom and instruction, for understanding words of insight, for gaining instruction in wise dealings, righteousness, justice, and equity."
- The amazing thing about the Bible is that there is always something new to learn.
- The first seven verses of Proverbs 1 introduces key words and concepts that are repeated throughout the Bible.

Wisdom

- God is in all caps to distinguish Him as LORD or Yahweh, reminding the reader that the beginning and the source of all wisdom comes from Yahweh/God.
- We live in a time where we have a whole world of information at our fingertips, so we turn to Google instead of God.
- The word "wisdom" used in Proverbs is the ability to discern what is true or right while our English word "wisdom" mainly has moral implications.
- The Hebrew word for wisdom distinguishes between wisdom and knowledge.
- Wisdom is the ability to use the tools of knowledge and intellect to live righteously.

Fear of the LORD

- "Fear of the LORD" refers to a special kind of relationship that is best described as a "covenant" relationship, a relationship based on mutual trust and commitment.
- "Fear" of the LORD is the start of a life-long process of knowledge.
- Nothing will happen on our journey to know God until we take that first step.
- Proverbs describes two types of paths, the path of the righteousness and the path of destruction.

Wisdom

- In Proverbs, Wisdom is described as a woman.
- Personification, such as portraying "Wisdom" as a woman, is a poetic and personal way of capturing and conveying the message.
- The ultimate personification of wisdom is Jesus Christ.
- Wisdom is not a body of principles or rules to memorize, it's knowing Jesus.
- The Bible is a pathway, not a door; it is not a destination, it is a process.
- The pursuit of Wisdom is one of the most important things that we can do in life.

Conclusion

- You cannot remember the Father's teaching or keep His commands if you do not know them.
- You cannot have a personal, intimate, covenant relationship with God unless you seek Him.
- God is committed to you and will never leave you nor forsake you.
