

God's Judgment on the Nations

- Amos pronounced God's judgment on six nations surrounding Judah and Israel.
- Amos was winding a noose around the neck of Israel.
- The judgment against each nation began with the statement, "Thus says the Lord."
- The opening phrase of each judgment: "For three transgressions of [the nation], and for four" was a way of expressing totality.
- God's mercy was replaced with judgment upon those who did not repent.
- Each judgment included an indictment of the sin of the nation as well as a sentence against each nation.

God's Judgment on Syria

 Though judgment was pronounced on Damascus, since it was the capital of Syria, judgment was for all of Syria.

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- The Syrians dragged instruments of torture, "sledges having iron teeth," over their Israelite prisoners.
- Syria was to be burned with fire and sent into exile.

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God's Judgment on Philistia

 The sin of Philistia was that they sold God's people into slavery.

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- Philistia not only sold the men as slaves, they sold the women and children into slavery as well.
- The Philistines wanted to get rid of all God's people.
- The sentence against Philistia was that they were to be torched and even the remnant of the Philistines killed.

God's Judgment on Phoenicia

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- The sin of Phoenicia was that they betrayed God's people and broke their treaty with them.
- The covenant spoken of here was not God's covenant with His people but a treaty made between Solomon and Hiram, King of Tyre.
- The Phoenicians violated that treaty and betrayed God's people.
- The sentence against Phoenicia was that their city would be burned.
- This prophecy was fulfilled when Nebuchadnezzar took it after a thirteen year siege.

God's Judgment on Edom

 Edom's sin was an unmerciful, unwearied pursuit of the people of God.

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- The Edomites used every opportunity to express their wrath and enmity against Israel.
- Whenever any enemy put Judah or Israel to flight, the Edomites would fall upon the rear, and kill those who were half dead, casting off all pity.
- The sentence against Edom was that their cities would be burned.

God's Judgment on Ammon

 The sin of Ammon was that they ripped open pregnant women in Gilead to enlarge their territory.

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- They wanted to eradicate the race of Israel by killing not only all who were born, but all who were to be born.
- Ammon wanted to enlarge their borders by keeping the land they had stolen from the Israelites.
- The sentence against Ammon was that their city would be burned and their royal leadership banished into exile.

God's Judgment on Moab

 The sin of Moab was that they desecrated graves, showing no respect for the dead.

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- Not content to leave the dead king of Edom in his grave, the Moabites got his bones and burned them to desecrate his memory.
- To abuse the dead bodies of kings, whose persons and names ought to be respected, is an affront to majesty.
- The sentence against Moab was that the nation would be burned and their leadership killed.

God's Judgment on His People

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- Amos' message was directed not only against Israel, but Judah as well since both Judah and Israel were at one time united.
- The sin of Judah was that they rejected the law of God.
- The sentence against Judah was that they will be burned and the city of Jerusalem destroyed.
- The sins of Israel included bribery, cruelty to the poor, immorality, hypocrisy, and tempting the godly to sin.
- The sentence against Israel was that their enemies would defeat them.

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Conclusion

- None of the surrounding nations had a relationship with God.
- They did not have the Law of God, but they did have God's law written on their hearts.

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- God will hold anyone responsible for sins that violate His law that is written on their hearts.
- God's people had the law of God, and yet they rejected God's law.
- A Christian is one who seeks to obey all of God's Word.
